) Opinion and Award

A. Kovacik had been established in the Normalizer Sequence of the 44" Hot Strip Mill with a sequential service date of April 29, 1948. On August 18, 1956 the normalizing operation was discontinued and he was stepped back to the Labor Pool.

A vacancy arose in the Wireman occupation in the Sheet Pickler and Scrubber Sequence on October 30, 1956. Because G. Henzi, then scheduled for the Labor Pool had worked thirty turns on extended operations as a Wireman in the sequence mentioned between January 2, 1956 and March 3, 1956, he was promoted to the vacancy referred to in accordance with the Company's interpretation of Article VII Section 5.

Kovacik filed a grievance claiming entitlement to the job and requested "all wages lost due to improper promotion."

The principles governing the acquisition of sequential standing by virtue of 30 turns worked on extended operations in situations such as that presented in this case were decided in Arbitration Nos. 167, 178, and 179. Those principles control this case.

In view of the extensive consideration given the problem presented by this case in the other cases cited above, a hearing was waived by the parties.

AWARD

The grievance is sustained, in accordance with the opinion and ruling in Arbitration No. 167.
